



Camping at the centre

The centre was founded in 1975 as a campsite to offer a space for water activities. Over 45 years later, this is still one of our core beliefs that water activities and more traditional scouting activities such as pioneering, backwoods cooking and camping should still be on offer to all young people using the centre. There are altar fires and a single campfire circle at the downstream area of the site.

The site has approximately 0.43 hectares of camping land available consisting of a large rectangular area with boundary fence to the surrounding farming land. We can comfortably accommodate camps of all sizes up to 80 campers.

There are toilets/changing rooms situated at each end of the main building.

Points to note when using the centre

- The surrounding farming land is often used for grazing cattle and members are requested to stay out of the fields when livestock are present
- There is a small number of picnic benches situated in front of the building which can be used
- Please sweep the site for any litter to preserve and protect the environment and wildlife.
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Safety near the water

On arrival to the site you will be able to meet the Assistant Campsite Warden often known as the Duty Warden for the weekend who will make themselves known to you. They all have a wealth of knowledge and experience to ensure your stay is as enjoyable as possible they will meet with you to discuss your programme for the weekend and make an introduction to your whole group at an appropriate time.

All visitors are requested to ensure activity on the campsite is safe. All visitors are requested to observe the signs of where buoyancy aids must be worn and other safety instructions given by the site staff.

In the event that the fire alarm is activated:

- All users must make their way safely from around the site to the fire assembly point
- The fire assembly point is on the Flag Break area, in front of the building
